For increasing periods each year, Arctic sea ice is melting and the permafrost on land is thawing. The region's unique natural and cultural landscapes are sensitive to a warming climate and enhanced human activity.

Some changes, such as increased risk of oil spills, have potentially dramatic negative consequences. Other shifts present new opportunities, such as the economic empowerment of native communities and seasonal shipping routes. Ensuring that negative impacts on the environment and existing native communities are minimized while retaining the viability of economic opportunities requires conscientious stewardship that focuses on sustainable development.

Diplomatic and economic actions can greatly affect the extent to which factors such as climate change and global commodity price fluctuations lead to economic, environmental and social changes. Future developments in the Arctic region are critically dependent upon environmental policy and business decisions made at national, regional and international levels; this is humanity's chance to aet it right.





A pair of entrepreneurs showcasing a novel redesign of the traditional wind turbine turned more than a few heads at the Nunavut Trade Show Sept. 23.

James Selkirk and Ronald Drews are the partners behind Nunaworks, a company that wants to market vertical axis wind turbines made by Saskatchewan's VBine Energy.

"It was designed to be simple and durable for Northern climates," said Drews, Nunaworks' managing partner. "We think it's an ideal solution for Nunavut."



'My lungs are dried out:' New product to tame dust can't come soon enough for Rankin Inlet


City of Iqaluit piloting new dust suppression product this summer
